Hi Maggie. Here is the info about avoiding potential disturbance impacts to northern spotted owls, marbled murrelets, and western lily associated with the activities you propose to undertake with the NFP monies.

For the spotted owl:

Avoid working in areas within 65 yards of potential habitat.

Avoid working in the time period March 1 - June 30.

If you can do both, there should be no impacts to spotted owls since your proposed activities do not involve habitat modification.

For the marbled murrelet:

Avoid working within 100 yards of potential habitat.

Avoid working in the time period April 1 - Aug 5 at any time; avoid working during the time periods of 2 hours after sunrise and 2 hours before sunset from Aug. 6 - Sept. 15.

If you can do both, there should be no impacts to marbled murrelets since your proposed activities do not involve habitat modification.

For either of these species, if you can avoid working within those distances of

potential habitat, regardless of the time period, there should be no impacts to them.

For the western lily:

Avoid working during the lily's growing season of March - September

By the way, the lily doesn't just always occur in wet/bog areas. It can occur on upland sites as well, although I think these will usually be close to wet areas.
